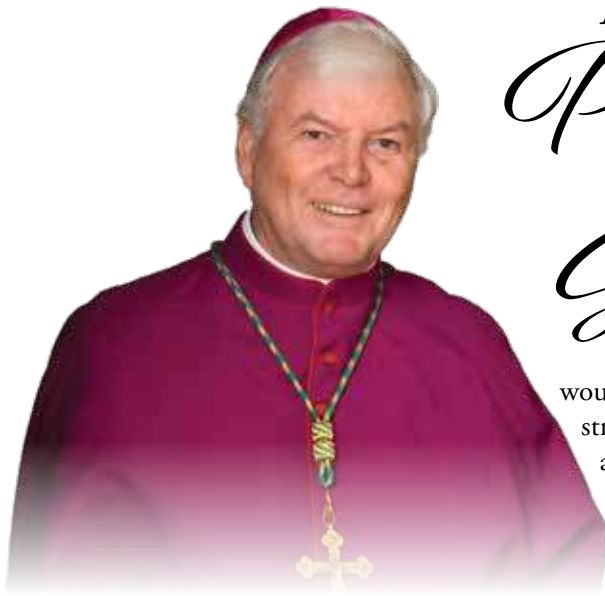

Bishop's Message

Pastoral Letter for the Season of Lent 2019



would have us light the Holy Fire by striking a spark from a flint, light and fire and life from inert and lifeless matter, a powerful picture of the resurrection where from dust and ashes arises the new life of the Risen Christ. In Genesis,

On Ash Wednesday one year ago a school shooting massacre occurred at the Parkland High School in Florida, resulting in seventeen deaths and a large number of wounded. Displayed prominently was a photo of anguished mothers arriving at the school to find out whether or not their child was a victim. One mother hugs another, and on her forehead is traced very visibly the cross she had received at an Ash Wednesday ceremony. "Dust to dust, ashes to ashes" was a refrain she heard that morning and would never have guessed how tragedy might visit her so starkly and so soon.

As a Church we are experiencing dark days, and the refrain of "dust to dust, ashes to ashes" is not without its meaning for us. We have the knowledge of victims of abuse whose lives were reduced to ashes, and are still tormented with sorrow. We have the disillusion, scandal and real grief confronting anybody named as Catholic in these days. In human terms we have the shock of the sudden death of one of the most revered priests in our community, Mgr Denis Edwards. His brother priests are devastated by his untimely loss, so that even while we profess our faith in the fullness of life into which Denis has entered, our human loss is so keen. "Dust to dust, ashes to ashes" is a real refrain in this case.

Ashes and dirt are basic items in our world. They are symbols of the plainness and origins and destiny of human existence. At the Easter Vigil the liturgy

when we were created, we were moulded from clay and earth, and into this lump of dead matter the Lord breathed His Spirit, and dead stuff became alive. The breath of God has been breathed into us, and dead matter was transformed into the image and likeness of God. In Lent we must look at our interior lives, breathed into by the Spirit, and shape our hearts to be adequate places of God's presence. "Behold, I make all things new".

May all those suffering in different ways, may we ourselves individually, and may the Church of God at large thrill with new life through this Lent as we journey towards Easter.

Movement Around the Diocese

The clergy transfers for 2019 are due to take effect by the third Sunday after Easter (11th May) unless otherwise notified. Pastoral responsibility for several communities has been transferred to another parish in a number of instances.

In some cases, the number of towns assigned to the pastoral care of the priest is too large to enable the Eucharist to be celebrated in every place, every weekend. There will therefore have to be a service of the Liturgy of the Word with Holy Communion in numbers of places on a rotational basis. This will require the appropriate training of laity to conduct such services. It is also an opportunity for an increased involvement in lay ministry.

These appointments are in the first instance for three years, to allow an incoming Bishop to observe the Diocese and determine his own wishes concerning the placement of the priests.

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National Redress Scheme

A new scheme to assist survivors of Child Sexual Abuse

A key recommendation of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse was that there be a national redress scheme. Redress is a word that means to remedy something wrong, or to set something right again. In practice, redress will likely include a monetary sum recognising the damage suffered by a child; an opportunity to receive an apology from a representative of the institution whose member committed the child sexual abuse; and the option of receiving professional counselling.

In some ways, the National Redress Scheme has features in common with the Church's Towards Healing process. One significant advantage is that it provides a consistent response across Australia, and across institutions, for survivors who suffered with different levels of abuse as children. So a person abused in the Scouts in WA, at a particular level of abuse, will receive a similar response to a person abused in a Catholic parish in SA, or a person abused in a dance school in NSW,

at the same level of abuse.

Our Diocese along with all the other Dioceses and Archdioceses strongly supported this recommendation, which was then accepted by the Commonwealth and eventually by all the states. The legal structure was then produced by the Commonwealth, to be run by the Department of Social Services, and we were required to produce all relevant information to enable our Diocese to be a participating institution. Cosimo, our Business Manager, shouldered the lion's share of this work. Our Diocese was signed up by the end of November 2018.

One challenging aspect for us as a Diocese is that, due to the lower level of proof required by the Scheme, our insurers are prevented from covering the Diocese for claims against us under the Scheme. The positive side of this is that survivors have a quicker and less stressful path to redress, so this is something we accept willingly as a Diocesan family. The survivors are our own family members; they are a part of

us, and they have a claim on our love and care. The Scheme has measures in place to eliminate false or mistaken claims.

The National Redress Scheme offers a third way for victims and survivors to find the way forward in their lives, to allow them to find healing for the deep-seated wounds inflicted by abusers in our church and in other organisations. The other options for people seeking redress continue to be available, namely, the Towards Healing process, and civil litigation.

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Father Lawrence Joseph Quinn

31st August 1931 – 30th January 2019

Excerpt from the funeral Mass Homily

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek". Melchizedek was the King of Salem, which means the King of Jerusalem, and he came out to meet Abraham who was on his journey to the Promised Land. He presented Abraham with gifts of bread and wine, and gave him a blessing from the All High. Because of this he has been seen as a figure of Christ. Certainly gifts of bread and wine, Body and Blood of Christ, were central to the priesthood of Fr Quinn, and the cover of today's Mass booklet shows him lifting up with joy the chalice presented to him in this church at the Golden Jubilee of his priesthood in 2013

Around 2.30 am on Wednesday Fr Laurie Quinn, aged eighty-seven, went to his reward. Father had suffered some type of brain bleed or stroke early on Friday and as a result he did not regain consciousness. His nephew Tom stayed with him throughout the whole time until his death, and Tom's wife Debbie spent this first 24 hours with him, while priests of the diocese came to his bedside to pray and bless him. Fr Steve Ardill anointed him, and as Bishop I read the Commendation of the Dying over him both before and after his death. Earlier in this final illness, when visiting and praying with him he was able to make efforts to trace the sign of the cross.

Fr Quinn worked on the family farm as a boy and young man and entered the seminary as a "late vocation" at the age of twenty-six. He served as a curate in Whyalla and as parish priest in Loxton, Port Lincoln and Burra.

It is true to say that Fr Quinn was one of the characters of the presbyterate of the Diocese, apt to repeat certain stories fairly frequently, and a source of anecdotes himself. He spent his last four years in St Joseph's House, and the prayerfulness of his life manifested itself so strongly there, when he would say six rosaries a day, usually in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. He was totally devoted to his vocation, a true and steadfast priest, a source of blessings for the diocese which was enriched by his priestly ministry of fifty-five years.

His Requiem Mass will take place in St Joseph's Church, Burra at 1.30 pm on Friday 8th February. It will be preceded by the Rosary at 1.15 pm. Burial will take place in the Burra Cemetery. Refreshments will be served later.

May he rest in the peace of Christ.

New Catholic Priest for Port Lincoln

A new priest has arrived in Port Lincoln to take over the work of Father Bill Weaschope at St. Mary's Catholic Church.

Father Lawrence Quinn came from the Parish of Loxton on the Murray River where he spent some years in parish priest.

"Before that he was an assistant parish priest for eight years in Whyalla where he was with Father Weaschope for five years."

"To continue on the work of Father Weaschope here means I like a lot of what he was doing," Father Quinn said.

The first he did not know much about the parish and Port Lincoln yet to introduce any significant changes.

After leaving school, Father Quinn worked on Burra for 12 years in his home region of Burra and Mount Whyalla. He was ordained at St. Joseph's Church, Burra, in June of 1960.

"I said apostles are interested in rural affairs," he said.

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St Mary MacKillop School Wallaroo S.A

Australia's longest Josephite School 1869-2019

From around 1865 a small Catholic School operated in Wallaroo, with the support of the visiting Jesuit Fathers, until the arrival in 1867, of the first resident Parish Priest, Father Kennedy, who immediately closed this school and refused to reopen it until he had the newly formed Sisters of St. Joseph in his parish.

So it was that in 1869, Sisters Catherine O'Brien aged 23 years and Margaret O'Loughlin, 18 years, set off by steamer to the Port of Wallaroo...

When I arrived in 1988, the age of computers had arrived and were being introduced into schools, except in Wallaroo as there was no such school. The hall across the road had been repurposed in 1885 and for 103 years provided 2 classrooms. The former convent opened in 1903 and was used for the junior primary class, and, along with a lone transportable library, we had a school! 119 years without a purpose-built facility! That's resilience!

It was a very much-loved school, which generations of families had attended. This school flourished, educating in the

Josephite Tradition, carried along on the hopes and dreams of the pioneering families.

Today this modern school standing on the site of that old Convent, proudly displays the school emblem above the entrance, indicating a school that educates in the Josephite Tradition. The emblem bears the words "In Omnibus Caritas – In all things Love"

Mary's vision is one still expressed today in the everyday life of this school. Under the good leadership of Mr. James Quigley and staff, this school continues to care for those on the margins because of geographical, economic or social issues.

It was delightful to see a statue of St. Joseph in the Reception area and it was even more impressive to see it placed on the floor instead of a pedestal, a very child friendly setting, where the statue is at eye level, well, for Reception students at least.

As Josephites we are proud that this unique school community continues to live the spirit and compassion of Mary MacKillop today as it continues to carry out God's mission.

A celebration fitting of 150 Years

The St Mary MacKillop School, Wallaroo community recently celebrated their significant milestone of 150 years of concurrent service to the families of the Copper Coast.

In what is the oldest continually running Catholic School in the state, events were scattered across three days of celebration and connection.

The celebrations began with a very moving and poignant assembly, delivered mostly by the students of the school. The celebrations acknowledged the amazing impact and service of the Sisters of St Joseph – as the original founding order of the school in 1869 and the leaders of the school for some 133 years until the first lay Principal was appointed in 2002.

The school's rich and vibrant history, which included moving sites, school mergers and a number of name changes was on display during the assembly which around 170 guests attended. This included Bishop Greg O'Kelly, Ms Nichii Mardon (Director of Catholic Education Pt Pirie Diocese), Mr Fraser Ellis (State member for Narrunga), Copper Coast Council representatives, old scholars, ex-staff, current and past parents and friends and of course a number of the current day Josephite sisters with connections to the school and special guest appearances from a young Sister Mary MacKillop and Fr Julian Tenison Woods.



On Saturday the school had an open day and welcomed through several old scholars, staff and current families who spent time sharing stories, viewing the displays and historical artefacts.

Saturday night was party time, and around 100 guests rocked the Wallaroo Town Hall with Adelaide party band 'The Escapades' providing a great atmosphere.

To conclude the weekend, the community gathered for a special Sesquicentenary Mass at Star of the Sea Church in Wallaroo.

Principal James Quigley said *"this weekend of celebrations has been about 12 months in the planning and the fact that it was so successful and so well attended at each event speaks volumes for not only the impact that our school has on past scholars and families but also the preparation and organisation of the events themselves. We are extremely proud of our long and rich history here in the Copper Coast and we can't wait for the next 150 years!"*.

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Our Lady Help of Christians, Principal Patroness

On May 24 the Catholic Church in Australia celebrates its National Patronal Feast, the Solemnity of Our Lady Help of Christians. It has been celebrated since 1844.

At the first provincial synod of the Catholic Church in Australia which took place in September 1844, Archbishop Polding of Sydney and the new bishops of Adelaide and Hobart met with about half of the three-dozen pioneer priests in the country and decided to place the Church in Australia under the patronage of the Virgin Mary invoked by the title Help of Christians. This was confirmed by the Holy See in 1852.

During the early days of the colony there were no priests. Later Mass was not allowed except for one brief year until 1820. But the Catholic community remained faithful to Mary. It was largely the Rosary in those early days that kept the faith alive.

Some Dioceses, Parishes and Schools have Our Lady Help of Christians as their Patronal Feast.

When a new Parish was set up in Whyalla West it was called Our Lady Help of Christians.

Our Lady Help of Christians is also a special feast of the Salesians.

In the Opening prayer of the Mass for Our Lady Help of Christians, the Church prays that through Our Lady's intercession God will "grant wisdom to our leaders and integrity to our citizens", so that "under her protection Australia may be granted harmony, justice and peace".

The Gospel readings tell us so much about Mary. In Year A we hear of Mary standing near the cross of her son Jesus. In Year B we hear of Mary visiting her cousin Elizabeth and praying her Magnificat. 'My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord and my spirit exults in God my saviour: because he has looked upon his lowly handmaid. ...' In Year C, this year, we hear Jesus say, 'My mother and my brothers are those who hear the word of God and put it into practice.' May Mary's example inspire us.

Our Lady Help of Christians (OLHC) will be celebrating the 50th anniversary of the church and the former Whyalla West Parish on Saturday and Sunday 25th & 26th May 2019.

Between 1956 and 1966 the population of Whyalla trebled due to the many immigrants obtaining work in the steelworks and shipyards. This was the background out of which the Parish of OLHC was established. (The Catholic community of Whyalla West had already been active for many years celebrating Mass in the Viscount Slim Hall as an outpost of St Teresa's Parish.) Fr Tim Toal parish priest at this time was instrumental in the early planning and work for Whyalla West to become a separate parish. This work was continued by Fr Bill Wauchope. Planning of a primary school, convent and

church/hall was under way in 1964. The school complex officially opened in 1966.

The Catholic Parish of Whyalla West officially began in May 1969, (on the Sunday following Ascension). The first parish priest was Fr John Curran, followed by Fr Arthur Hackett and finally Fr Tony Redden. Many current priests undertook placement in the parish either as seminarians, "half curates" (i.e. shared with St Teresa's) or assistant priests, such as, Fr Leon Quinn, Fr Brian Mathews, Fr John Folkman, Fr Kevin Matthews, and Fr Chris Warnock.

A Good Samaritan Sister, Jill O'Brien commenced in 1974 as a Parish Pastoral Assistant, a new initiative within the church community. She commenced at the same time as Fr Hackett and together they formed a dynamic team to implement

many changes as a result of Vatican 11. Sr Jill was followed by Srs Rita Fitt, Glenys Dellamarta, Eugennie Levinson and Robyn Brady, each bringing their own gifts to this role and the community. These women were at the forefront of our spiritual direction and their impact in the parish cannot be under-estimated.

In 1973 the Missionary Sisters of Service convent was (built on the grounds of the parish and school. The) officially opened in the presence of Archbishop Guilford Young Tasmania, Bishop Gallagher (Port Pirie Diocese) and Bishop Kennedy – (Adelaide). The MSS's role was to minister to those in rural and remote areas.

Because the parishioners of OLHC came from all parts of the world, they viewed the church and other parishioners as family giving OLHC church a special feeling of community (over the years). Social events, such as, parish picnics, progressive dinners, Planned Giving dinners, farewells and any other reason to celebrate have played an important role in the life of the parish. And nobody can forget the antics of the Mad Mums!

The spiritual life of the parish developed continuously throughout the years with parishioners being involved in Catholic Women's League, Legion of Mary, St Vincent de Paul Society, 'Wine, Women

and Wisdom', Parish Retreats, Small Faith Groups, Young Christian Workers, Youth Group, Twilight Celebrations for Children from non-Catholic schools as some examples. Altar servers were, and still are, ably trained by Bill Redford with the Guild of St Stephen commencing in 1977. In 1979 the parish undertook the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults program, (RCIA) being the first parish in Australia to share this process with the parishioners rather than it being a private confidential tuition.

Children's Liturgy of the Word commenced in 1987 (and has been popular since). Parishioners have undertaken training to be Special Ministers of the Eucharist to the sick and homebound as well as Ministers of the Word and Eucharistic Ministers at Mass. A special feature associated with OLHC is the crucifix over the altar. Fr Hackett commissioned Richard Sobczak to make this sculpture in copper in 1981. Many parishioners, on leaving the parish, would have been given a card with a photo of the crucifix on it as a farewell token. Due to reduced numbers and shortage of priests (over the years,) plans were made and developed for the amalgamation of OLHC and St Teresa's parishes. Fr Tony Redden, Fr Paul Bourke and a committee spent many hours planning for a smooth transition. In 2007, the Catholic Parish of Whyalla was formed.

The Story of the Josephite Motor Missions

Does anyone remember?

Some of our readers may already know that Sister Elizabeth Morris is writing the history of the Josephite Motor Missions in South Australia. Sr Liz would love to hear from anyone who remembers those days. The first Motor Mission in the Port Pirie Diocese began in 1960 and was based at Peterborough. Peterborough had an almost 30 year history of Summer schools, begun in 1931 by Bishop Killian. Sisters Edwin (Marie) Taylor and Patrice Burns began the work and then Sr Nicholas (Mary) Canny joined Sr Edwin in May of that year. The Sisters visited as many as 21 schools in a broad sweep that took them across six parishes, including Port Augusta and Quorn – later they also included Hawker. In 1971 Port Augusta became their base. In 1966, the year after the Catholic School at Georgetown

closed a Motor Mission began in the State Schools in the parishes of Georgetown, Gladstone, Laura, Spalding, Snowtown and Jamestown. The third Mission in the Diocese was at Waikerie between 1964 and 1971. After 1973, when the weekly RI ceased the Sisters continued outreach to the parishes and families for many years. Sr Kerry Keenan is the last Josephite to carry on the Motor Mission tradition in the Diocese. The Pekina Training Centre, set up in 1972, was important in their ministry, especially for Secondary school students. SO – if you were a student, a parent, a catechist, a helper on the Camps or someone who went to the Summer schools, Sr Liz would love you to get in touch. Sr Mary Terese died in September 2018. Her family, some of whom still have links with the Diocese, is keen to share her story.

Mary Terese Dalzell was born in August, 1925, at Morgan, the first child of John and Irene Dalzell (née Kinnane). John had fought at Gallipoli and later in Egypt and Palestine with the Third Light Horse Regiment thus enabling him to take up land in the new fruit-growing area of Cadell, which became the family home for the next 50 years.

Unfortunately, Mary was born with cerebral palsy, a lifelong disability she carried with dignity and stoicism. The family church was St Ursula's in Morgan and it was here that the young family attended Sunday Mass, travelling there by horse and cart in the early days.

Mary attended the local Cadell state school for four years, then, aged nine, went to St Scholastica's College at Mt Barker. She loved those years under the guidance of the Sisters of Mercy and no doubt they had a huge influence on her later decisions.

Four more children were added to the Dalzell family with the birth of David, Brian and Anthony (Tony) and Josephine. When Josie was born, Mary, then 16, left school to return to Cadell to help with the growing boys and the new baby.

Over the next few years Mary worked in Adelaide in Charles Birk's department

store. She was presented to the Archbishop as a debutante at a Catholic Ball and she joined the Therry Dramatic Society. Unbeknownst to her parents, she was thinking about her vocation and how it could be achieved. Most Australian Religious Orders required their sisters to become teachers or nurses, professions for which Mary was unsuited.

In January, 1949, she and her friend, Mary Gleeson, sister of Archbishop James Gleeson, set out on a twelve month holiday to England, visiting her father's relatives in the north of England, and touring the UK and Europe. While living in Kensington, London, she discovered and was accepted into the Belgian Order, Religious of the Eucharist.

Mary completed her novitiate in Brussels, where the principal language spoken was French. In 1952 she was fully professed as a Religious of the Eucharist in a ceremony which her parents attended.

In 1965, Mary made her first visit back to Australia. From then on she visited her family every five years and was present at family celebrations. In 2002 her four siblings and their partners travelled to the UK to

attend her Golden Jubilee as a religious sister.

The last thirty-one years of her life were spent at Kearsney Manor Nursing Home in Kent, where she was in charge of seven elderly sisters. She loved the beautiful grounds of the Manor, the serenity of the lake with its birdlife, and the majestic English trees. So it was only fitting that with her passing on September 18th, 2018, she should be laid to rest in the grounds of Kearsney Manor.

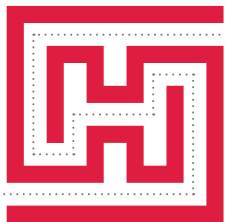

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Having Life to the Full.

This morning I wish to speak about a social development going on in our State. Abortion has become something of an accepted practice. There are now several abortions a day in South Australia. Some members of the anti-abortion campaign have sometimes done the wrong thing, have sometimes engaged in harassment and confrontation. That is not correct because it does not reflect the gentleness of Christ, the way he treated the woman taken in adultery for example, when He knelt next to her and asked, "Has no one else condemned you?" It would be normal for women seeking abortion to be afflicted by the terrible decision they are making, one that defies their nature, and while the act is abhorrent and wrong, charity and sensitivity and awareness of suffering must shape the style of our response.

Pope Francis has asked us to look at the issue as a holistic thing, as a total perspective. It comes out of Our Lord's

words: "I have come that you may have life and have it to the full". Pope Francis says that the Christian attitude to life must embrace everything from conception to natural death. And so it covers actions like abortion; it covers actions like capital punishment. It's odd to be opposed to abortion and then yet support capital punishment; there's a contradiction there.

This Christian overall outlook on this issue also includes in its scope the poor and the vulnerable - those who haven't got enough in order to have a proper human life. The Christian attitude to life also covers the environment, the Pope says, because we must not destroy that which gives us life. It covers the end of life as in the need for palliative care rather than euthanasia. This is the Christian attitude to all of life - we just don't isolate abortion and speak about it by itself. It's part of a whole framework of how the Christian regards life as a gift of God. As Saint Pope John Paul II said:

"Life is a gift that God gives forever."

We have now a Bill being proposed in our Parliament by Tammy Franks, the Greens Member. This Bill aims to remove all laws around the ending of the life of pre-born babies. The unborn deserve love, not destruction, and in Tammy Franks speech there is nothing of love expressed towards the unborn.

It would be most appropriate for everybody to talk to their local Member of Parliament and beg them not to pass such a law. And we say this in the context of the meaning of love. Love is patient and kind as St Paul wrote; love is gentle; love is not boastful; and love never comes to an end.

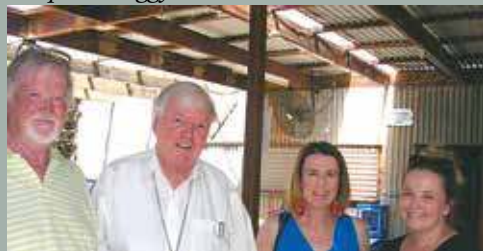

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Child Protection Matters and the Church

Bishop Gerard Holohan of Bunbury, WA, recently wrote to parishioners and parents of students in Catholic schools to mention actions taken by the Church, as well as the implementation of steps moving forward in relation to child protection matters. The following excerpts are taken from aforementioned letter.

The Australian Catholic Bishops began facing the issues related to child abuse in 1987 – 32 years ago. Between 1987 and 2013, there were many developments: the adoption of a uniform approach across Australia to prevent cover-ups and the movements of criminal priests and religious; the Towards Healing process, which sought to assist the healing of survivors; the Integrity in Ministry and Integrity in the Service of the Church documents, which related to the professional behavior required of priests and laity working in the Church.

Professional Standards offices were established to investigate allegations of abuse at arms-length from Bishops. A national professional standards body was established to keep improving Church structures and propose new initiatives.

The Australian Bishops, with Catholic Religious Australia, have adopted all

recommendations for the Catholic Church made by the Royal Commission, except in regard of the Seal of Confession, which is not a matter the Church has the power to change.

Priests and Deacons across Australia today are registered on The Australian Catholic Ministry Register. When a Priest or Deacon from another place comes to a parish, the Parish Priest must ask for his Register number and check on line that the visitor is approved. Any parishioner concerns can be reported to Parish Safeguarding Officers or the Diocesan Safeguarding Coordinator. The Coordinator will report any potentially criminal behavior to the police, and other non-criminal matters to the relevant Church Office.

The Australian Bishops, with Catholic Religious Australia, have established Australian Catholic Redress Limited. This is the vehicle which relates to the Commonwealth authority administering the National Redress Scheme.

What should each of us do now?

Keep contributing to the Community

Depending on their size, our parishes contribute to the care of the sick and elderly; the poor and troubled; to those

living alone and young people; to those in prisons and other situations of need. If you are not part of a parish ministry, perhaps this is a good time to join.

Let us care also for each other. The two disciples on the Journey to Emmaus were shocked, downcast and discouraged by the death of Jesus, in whom they had placed all their hopes. The Risen Jesus joined them and helped them to understand. 'Did not our heart burn within us' they asked after this experience of the Lord [Luke 24: 13-35].

And, let all talk with each other about how we are feeling at this time, encouraging each other, including our priests, school principals and parish leaders who are seen as the local face of the Church.
