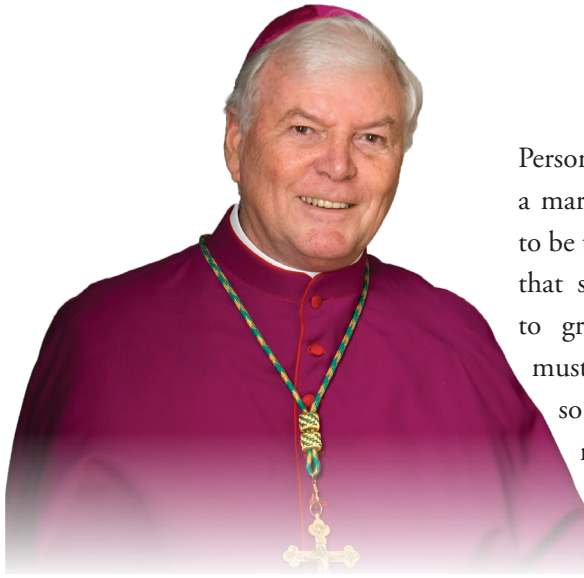

# Life in Abundance

Personal contentment and joy should be a mark of the Christian. We know Jesus to be the author of life, so it is not strange that so many of His teachings referred to growing things, like wheat, vines, mustard trees, fig trees, rain, seeds, and so on. Jesus described Himself as the resurrection and the life, and said that He was the way, the truth and the life. Christians are to be apostles of life.

charity, compassion... What diminishes life is evil – dishonesty, betrayal, infidelity, addictions of any type, violence, personal invasion...

There is a hymn in the Morning Prayer of the breviary:

May what is false within us  
before your truth give way.  
That we may live untroubled,  
with quiet hearts this day.

We have never had so much materially or scientifically. We have a way of life adorned with creature comforts that were unthinkable not so long ago, and with the technology to enable opportunities that formerly we could only dream of.

Yet at the same time we live in what John Paul II called a culture of death, an era of diminishment of the human spirit. If we have not sold our souls in 21st century Australia to the devil, we are otherwise occupied in adoring golden calves.

We live in an age of glitz and appearance (read the lifestyle magazines), and our society in consumerism focuses on what is possessed rather than who possesses.

To the astonishment of a Christian, we have politicians who promote death as a good to be accomplished by human intervention, against the two most fragile sections of our society, the unborn and the elderly frail. We sanitise our language, and with abortion and euthanasia may not use the word “kill” but rather say terminate or euthanase. In the same sex marriage debate, the language was changed from the meaning of marriage as a covenant between a man and a woman to the concept of marriage equality. Abortion is now referred to as a medical procedure, or women’s reproductive health. Euthanasia is now described as death with dignity. But to us Jesus said that He had come that we might have life and have it to the full.

We call the Father the creator, the Son the resurrection, and the Holy Spirit the giver of life. Life was a supreme act of creation, as outlined in the Book of Genesis, with human beings being the crown and summit. God saw that it was good, and that with humanity He saw that it was very good. Life is the area of the Divine.

Christians are therefore to be respecters of life in all its forms. We are to care and protect the unborn and those who through sickness are on the edge of life. While we oppose abortion, we must also oppose torture, capital punishment, and all forms of violence that have no basis in morality.

Christian morality highlights life as a criterion of good and evil. What enhances life is good – love, fidelity, truthfulness,

We pray for all that they may live untroubled lives with quiet hearts. Life troubled is not what God intended for us. But to live lives untroubled we must look to the life of our hearts, what feeds us in prayer, how the Lord speaks to the life within us.

St Bernard has a beautiful line in one of his sermons – “God Himself dwells in the heart and speaks in the heart... Let our life be in the heart, where Christ dwells”.

Jesus taught us to look at our hearts, for that is from where all goodness and evil comes, from inside a person. We are to be apostles of life, so we must look to our hearts, and see who dwells there, or what occupies it.

For the person who prays, it will be Christ who dwells in his/her heart. And He is the Lord of life, who came that we might have it to the full.

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## Saint of the Month



### St Francis of Assisi - 1182-1226

The Italian mystic St. Francis of Assisi founded the religious order known as the Franciscans. He became renowned for his love, simplicity, and practice of poverty.

Francis was born in Assisi, Italy in 1182. He grew up leading a privileged life as the son of a wealthy cloth merchant. Saint Francis of Assisi was a Catholic friar who gave up a life of wealth to live a life of poverty. He established the Franciscan Order of friars and the women's Order of the Poor Ladies.

He was canonized as a Saint just two years after his death, on July 16, 1228, by his former protector, Pope Gregory IX. Today, Saint Francis of Assisi is the patron saint for ecologists, a title honoring his boundless love for animals and nature. He is the patron saint of the environment and animals because he loved all creatures and allegedly preached to even the birds.

A prayer of St. Francis of Assisi: "Lord, make me an instrument of your peace; where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; and where there is sadness, joy.

# Prison Ministry Day of Reflection

## Through the Slot...



Following a concelebrated Mass by Fathers Adrian Head, John Folkman and Khalid Marogi at a Day of Reflection for Prison

Ministry, Father Khalid introduced guest speaker, Jwan Kada, a young woman who was first inspired by Fr Khalid as a member of the Chaldean Community.

Jwan spoke of her mission to the youth in prison. She regularly visits juvenile detention centres in Victoria. She spoke about a standard day in a centre including a school day which runs from 9:30am until 4pm. Subjects covered are sport, art therapy, dance, music and health and well-being.

They have minimal autonomy and must ask permission for almost everything, this creates structure and discipline.

Because of staff shortages across Victoria, prisoners can be locked in their rooms from 4pm until 9am. This can cause violence at times as kids are locked away for so long and get frustrated.



Juveniles in detention face many social disadvantages including homelessness, mental illness, drug and alcohol abuse, they may have experienced trauma, violence of neglect and most have been suspended or are expelled from school.

Jwan tries to be more like a friend rather than a punitive figure. Mostly she does ministering through a slot in the door. She sits on a chair outside the room and talks to the youth through the slot. The reality of prison can be quite confronting. She tries to minister with, rather than ministering to, the youth - a ministry of presence; kinship, compassion, and radical tenderness like Jesus. And sometimes she just laughs with them...

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# Alpha in Whyalla

## What is Alpha?

In the 1970's, in London, a course at Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Brompton, began to train curates in common Christian beliefs. It has since spread to many Christian churches around the world through the leadership of Rev Nicky Gumbel. Alpha has been active in the Port Pirie Catholic Diocese in the past ten years, when David and Janette Willson did the first session there and have continued each year since.

Father Jim Monaghan asked members of the Whyalla Parish Council to explore Alpha back in 2016. They found Alpha is a series of interactive sessions exploring the Christian faith. There are three common things in the course around the world: food, a talk and good conversation.

Weekend training was held in January, 2017, and David and Janette Willson and Frank Fahy from Port Pirie were invited to be facilitators. Lorraine McCarthy from Alpha in the Catholic Context was then contacted to send suitable material to Whyalla. The core leaders met regularly that year to gain confidence in leading the parish in Alpha.

The course was well advertised in the parish and on May 3rd, 2018, the first

ten -week course began. There was a video after the meal each week and then discussion. Topics include Faith, Jesus, why Jesus died, Prayer, Bible and God's guidance. A weekend of prayer is part of the course, but one full Saturday was found to be suitable. In the first course parish members were invited to cook or serve at tables. In the second course, with over ten leaders, it was suggested the leaders could provide the meals.

The Alpha Course can help people of no religious background, people who have drifted apart from the Church, people who have struggled to make the transition into an adult faith and committed Catholics looking for a refresher. There were over twenty participants in the first Alpha course. Two of them joined the RCIA to find out more about the Catholic faith, two of the people joined the leadership team and others felt that their faith had grown as a result of being involved in Alpha.

Another Alpha Course is planned in Whyalla during 2019 and the Alpha leaders are praying for people who may respond. Perhaps your parish may be interested in running an Alpha Course!

Some highlights of the year included:

- Coordinating an International Luncheon on Migrant and Refugee Sunday. This was held at St Mark's College, Benedict



Campus and was attended by over 100 people. Besides enjoying the vast array of food from various countries, the crowd listened to the story of Michael Cruz who came from the Philippines to live in Port Pirie. There was also the story told by students and staff from St Mark's College about their immersion trip to the

Philippines. After this we had singing and dancing by different cultural groups. It was a great occasion for many parishioners to get together to recognise and celebrate our cultural diversity. The event raised approximately \$1,200.

- Our Charitable Projects raffle which raised approximately \$1,400 for our Charitable Projects Fund.

- A donation of \$400 to the Diocese of Townsville for their flood appeal

- A \$200 donation went to a charitable trust to support Youth programmes in drought affected areas of the Eyre Peninsula.

- A donation of \$400 to support the youth ministry led by Father Harold Camonias, in particular to assist with the costs associated with the Missionaries of God's Love visit.

- A donation of \$300 to support the St Marks students Immersion trip to the Philippines.

- Supporting the organisation of the menALIVE Retreat attended by 25 men

- Rostered weekly attendance at Men's "Happy Hour" at two aged care facilities, Willochra Home at Crystal Brook and St Joseph's House at Port Pirie every Friday to provide fellowship for male residents.

## Eighty Years of Catholic 'Church' in Loxton

Despite having a place in which to attend Mass for 80 years in Loxton, over those years the 'church' has been different buildings at three different locations.

"Loxton's first church was erected in 1939 under the guidance of Fr D O'Connell. It was a timber framed building and stood on the corner of Drabsch and Sadleir Streets. The little church served the Catholic population until the 1950's when it was sold." (A history of the Catholic Church in Loxton 1894-1999 compiled by Joyce and Pat West)

Come 1953, the new Parish of Loxton, which included Galga, Wanbi and Paruna, was declared by Bishop Bryan Gallagher and Fr Kevin Flinn was appointed the first parish priest.

Fast on the back of that came the opening of St Albert's Catholic School and Convent in 1956 which was run by the Dominican nuns from Cabra.

Sunday Mass was then celebrated in one of the classrooms of the first school building.

Later Masses were transferred to a new building which was eventually destroyed by fire in 1987.

Under the guidance and determination of Fr Adrian Noonan, just two and a half years later, the new St Albert's Church was opened and blessed by Bishop De Campo.

To mark the 80 years, the Loxton Mass centre (now part of the larger Our Lady of the River Parish) will celebrate at the time of the feast of St Albert (15th November).

It is planned to have a shared luncheon, with lots of time to reminisce, following 11am Mass on Sunday 17th November.

## St Mark's College Port Pirie-Philippines Immersion 2019

There was laughter. There were tears. There was excitement. There was growth. Our time in the Philippines was enriching and challenging. Throughout our journey, we made new friends, experienced the greatest of hospitality and were reminded that happiness comes from within, not from our possessions.

Our College has built a growing relationship with the Philippines over the past 8 years. This was our 4th Immersion, with the outreach experience taking place biannually. 15 students and 3 staff members accompanied by Fr Harold Camonias travelled for 12 days visiting schools, communities, aged care facilities and places of national significance.

Our journey was not without challenge, as we experienced the beauty but also the harsh realities of life. The most rewarding

aspect of our journey was the time we spent in community receiving the fellowship and generosity of the Filipino people. Our sense of belonging and welcome in each community we visited was instant. We visited the poorest of the poor and learned that our presence in their lives and community was just as important as our monetary donation given from the team's fundraising efforts.

We learnt the importance of valuing education and opportunities, with many unable to afford formal education beyond the elementary years.

We were fortunate to swim with whale sharks in Oslob and take in the breathtaking views of natural environment that we called “God's Playground”.

As a result of this outreach experience our young people have grown in empathy, compassion, generosity and kindness. Unsurprisingly so, they also return more resilient and independent having been away from their families for two weeks. The immersion experience brought us closer as a group as we shared a love of this

beautiful country and culture.

The importance of family was demonstrated and the need to serve others experienced. We learnt the importance of being the first to give and the last to receive. Importantly, our faith was strengthened.

We will forever be grateful for this time of journey.

## Caritas College Celebrates

Caritas College celebrated the Feast of Mary MacKillop, noting that this was the 110th anniversary of her death. Our Liturgy for the day was based on "Learning from Mary MacKillop to live in harmony and peace" and what an example she was. The Liturgy was ably led by our School Leaders while each class took on the task of examining peacefulness and calmness in Mary's life. We saw that she;



- Acknowledged the sacredness of each person, especially children.
- Had empathy for those who suffered hardship, were unemployed or destitute
- Saw education as a means of living with purpose, and so classes were held in the evenings for these people
- Believed that all children had a right to an education, regardless of their isolation, their beliefs, or their financial situation
- Showed great calmness in the face of false accusations and prayed for those who wronged her
- Was never afraid to take a stance especially when she saw justice and power being misused
- Never forgot that God was her leading light, through whom strength confidence and gentleness, were the answer to her prayers.

Our parish priest Fr Jim Monaghan was given a special welcome as this was his first encounter with our school as a whole unit. Our Primary Choir excelled themselves in leading the singing and the Year 7s re-enacted an episode from Mary's life demonstrating how she shared God's love with others, especially children.

In typical Mary MacKillop tradition, the afternoon was given over to the students for fun and games, these were organised by the Year 12s and are one of the highlights of the year for our students. With the promise of "No Homework" from our Principal Mr. Damian Smith, the celebration of this woman, St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, who founded our school 148 years ago, came to a close.



## Sevenhill Seminar Day for Caritas Yr 12

On Friday 30th August, our Year 12 students, accompanied by Mrs Christine Kemp, Ms Michelle Antoniciello and Fr Khalid Marogi travelled to the Sevenhill Centre of Ignatian Spirituality for their final Studies in Religious Education Seminar Day. The College's connection with Sevenhill goes back to the

excommunication of Mary MacKillop in 1871.

The intention of the Seminar Day was for students to:

- Deepen their understanding of a personal vision and vocation in life

- Reflect on how Mary MacKillop's call to, and acceptance of her vocation, impacted on her life and can serve as a guide for us today
- Explore traditional, contemporary and future models of vocation
- Design and participate in a liturgy to enhance their own spirituality



The students also completed a guided tour of St Aloysius' Church, the crypt, College building, and Weikert Cottage ruins. The Jesuits provided refuge for Mary MacKillop in Weikert Cottage so she could visit with her brothers who were both studying at the Sevenhill College. Julian Tenison Woods, co-founder of the Sisters of St Joseph, also completed some of his studies with the Jesuits at Sevenhill.

The day therefore provided a number of opportunities for the students to connect with the stories of Mary MacKillop and the history of our College in an authentic and tangible way.

# Child Protection Council

## Child Protection Sunday

On Sept 8th at the conclusion of National Child Protection Week, the Catholic Church celebrated Child Protection Sunday. In the parishes, communities acknowledged the suffering of people affected by child sexual abuse and their families as well as acknowledging the commitment of the Church to provide safer environments for young people. Resources from the National Association for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (NAPCAN) were made available. These included informative, easy to read pamphlets titled 'Listening to Children' and 'Being a Dad' (Google 'NAPCAN' to see these and other resources).



Children were given a worksheet to identify trusted adults in their life – people with whom they can speak when they feel scared, curious, embarrassed, sad or worried.

## Child Safe Environments

Other aspects of Child Protection: On August 29th and Sept 18th, in Port Pirie and Whyalla many of our clergy, religious, pastoral associates and employees

undertook a 3.5 hour refresher course in CSE (*Child Safe Environments*). Many thanks to Ulrike Marwitz from the Professional Standards Office and Kaci Williams and Kimberley Pursche from Centacare for providing this training.



## National Catholic Safeguarding Standards

On September 11th Daniele Donnini and Luke Whiteside of Catholic Professional Standards Limited (CPSL) delivered the National Catholic Safeguarding Standards workshop. 25 people attended in person with another eight attending via videoconference. This session had an operational/implementation focus, aimed at establishing a baseline of understanding of both the Standards and implementation requirements to facilitate creating a culture of safeguarding.

Each participant came away with some key



tools and resources to support this work within their organisation by developing an action plan and focused activities to identify and overcome barriers to reporting; build capacity in risk management; complaints handling; training and education; people management and a thorough understanding of the CPSL Self-assessment.

## 90 Minute CSE Briefing for Volunteers

For our all our volunteer parishioners, the Child Protection Council is making available a 90 minute briefing in child safe environments. The first of these was held in Port Augusta in July. The briefing will be rolled out to other parishes and regions beginning with those in which a Centacare office is present. Many thanks to the staff of Centacare, Darlene Whyatt and Kimblerly Pursche, for providing these briefings.

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## 40 Years of the Cathedral Pipe Organ

On Sunday 29 September approximately 300 people celebrated 40 years of organ music in the Cathedral. A recital was held at 2.30pm with Fr Ray Pope in attendance as guest of honour in recognition of all the work he did to install the organ and maintain it for many years, a real legacy.

Here are some interesting snippets of information and historic details of the pipe organ.

- Bishop Gallagher and Fr Ray Pope VG, purchased the pipe organ for the sum of \$5,100 from Elder Conservatorium in May of 1977
- Extending and strengthening the choir gallery in the Cathedral prior to installation came at a cost of \$30,000

- Rebuilding of the organ cost \$28,000
- When the grand old organ was installed at St Mark's Cathedral she was valued at \$250,000
- On 2nd September 1979 at 2.30pm the first Recital was presented by Mr James Govenlock and Mr David Swale, organists of St Francis Xavier's Cathedral and St Peter's Cathedral respectively.

Since that day our pipe organ has been meticulously cared for by Fr Pope, the keeper of the 'mysteries' of the organ. His special presence as 'Guest of Honour' this year at the 40th Anniversary Recital was richly deserved

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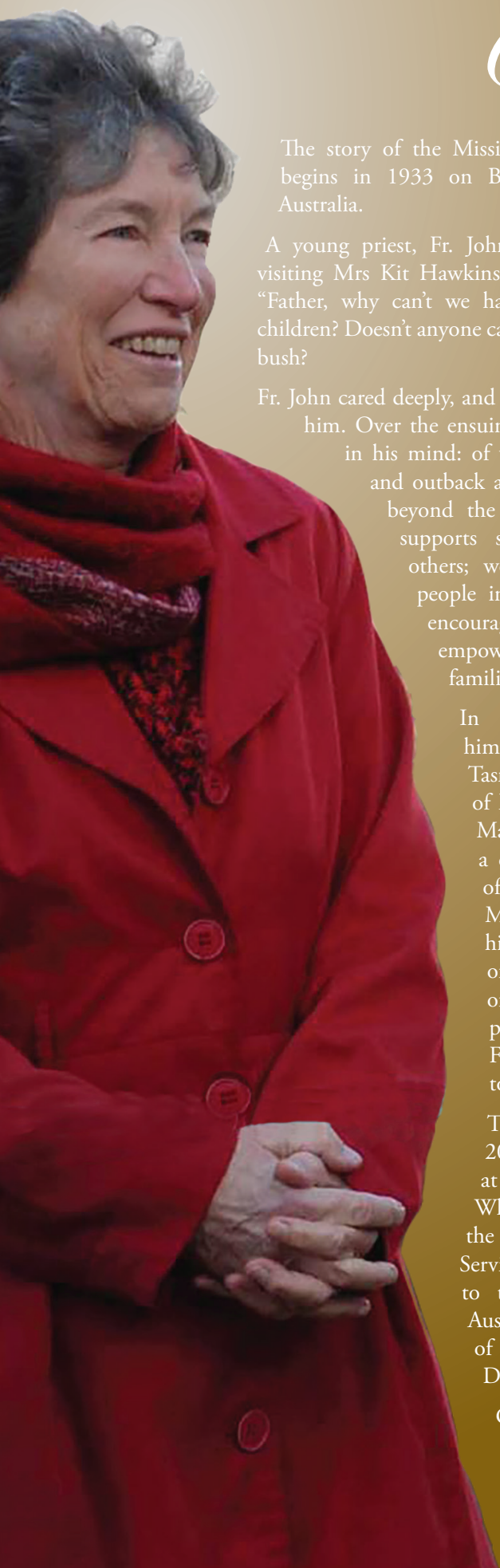
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# Missionary Sisters of Service Celebrate 75 Years



The story of the Missionary Sisters of Service begins in 1933 on Bruny Island, Tasmania, Australia.

A young priest, Fr. John Corcoran Wallis, was visiting Mrs Kit Hawkins when she said to him: "Father, why can't we have sisters to teach our children? Doesn't anyone care about us people in the bush?"

Fr. John cared deeply, and the question stayed with him. Over the ensuing years a vision formed in his mind: of women going into rural and outback areas, seeking out people beyond the reach of the care and supports so readily available to others; women who would visit people in their homes, support, encourage, counsel, teach and empower them to nourish their families and communities.

In 1943 Fr John found himself in Burnie, north-west Tasmania, where he spoke of his vision at a Legion of Mary meeting. It awakened a call in the heart of one of his listeners, Gwen Morse. She approached him: "Father, if I can be of any use to that dream of yours, I am ready to be part of it." The dream of Fr John's heart was about to become a reality.

Thursday 15th August 2019 saw big celebrations at the Catholic Parish of Whyalla to commemorate the Missionary Sisters of Service 75 years of service to the country people of Australia and for 48 years of service in the Port Pirie Diocese.

Guests of honour for the special day of celebration included

Congregational Leader Sr Stancea Vichie, Sr Bernadette Wallis, who wrote the book 'Dear Mother Dear Father' which contains letters Father Wallis sent home, Sr Cheryle Thompson, who works in the parish of Whyalla as part of the Parish Pastoral Team and executive officer of the John Wallis Foundation Liz McAloon.

Bishop Gregory O'Kelly SJ congratulated the MSS for their great work in the Diocese of Port Pirie over the span of their service.

Sr Stancea Vichie MSS spoke of the aging population of sisters and how they have set up a trust 'The Highways and Byways Small Grants Program' to continue good works in isolated areas. Five projects in the Diocese were successful in obtaining a grant.

In the evening a Mass was held for the feast of Assumption and a shared dinner followed so all visitors could have a chance to speak and reminisce with the sisters

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# Hawker Church Upgrade

Saints Philip and James Church, Hawker, has undergone extensive renovations, our first Mass after the restorations was a weekday Mass celebrated on Friday 6th September.

External work included the total replacement of roofing iron, dormer vents and fascias. The four crosses and decorative spikes have been recoated and firmly secured back on the roof. Now our church has a fine appearance and is structurally sound to withstand the elements. Much work has been performed inside also. The ceiling has been varnished, the walls repaired and fully painted. The floor has been restored to its original condition and the sanctuary together with the aisle carpeted. The comfort of the parishioners has been taken into consideration as we now have insulation in the ceiling, heating and air conditioning.

All this has been made possible by a generous donation by the Hawker Arts Group combined with a grant from the National Radioactive Waste Management Facility Community Benefit Programme. The undertaking was a joint project of the combined Christian churches of Hawker, being the Hawker Uniting Church and the Catholic Church of Saints Philip and James, whereby both churches received substantial monies to rejuvenate the two church buildings. When the project was in the development phase there were three main objectives, being; firstly our desire to do some much needed repair work; secondly a local desire to preserve two of the towns historical buildings, hence the Arts grant and thirdly; a desire to demonstrate a Christian unity and the joint Christian project was considered a

worthy way to achieve such an outcome.

Our parish priest, Fr Jimmy Pantin has been a strong supporter of the project, in more recent time our new parish priest, Fr Harold Camonias is a source of great encouragement. Support was also received from the Chancery; Fr Jim Monaghan and Mr Neil Davidson have given very good direction and guided the project to where we are now. It must be recognised that the Hawker Uniting Church was the grant applicant for our joint Christian project and we are thankful for the work of Mr Greg Moore and his team at the Uniting Church. At a grassroots level the three Morgan brothers; Brady, Alex and Terry took a very holistic approach to the building and provided many extras in both time and materials and the results are spectacular. A big thank you must also go out to the people who have lugged furniture around, removing and returning the pews, and other heavy items, from and back into the church. And not forgetting all those who wrote letters of support right back at the start. We parishioners are the beneficiaries of all the good work and are most grateful to all who contributed.

## St Francis of Assisi Catholic Church Moonta

150th anniversary celebrations for the opening of Moonta's St. Francis of Assisi church are set to take place in December.

Bishop Greg O'Kelly SJ, will be conducting a Mass at the church on Sunday, December 1st, 2019, at 10.30am located on the corner of Blanche Terrace and Roberts Street, Moonta.

The parish, within the Diocese of Adelaide, was initially served between 1861 – 65 by Father John Pallhuber, a Jesuit priest from Sevenhills who came on horseback every two weeks to celebrate Masses, marriages and baptisms in Kadina, Wallaroo and Moonta.

In 1865, it was established as a parish under the pastoral care of Father Christopher Reynolds as parish priest who came regularly from Morphett Vale. Father Reynolds was later to become Bishop of Adelaide.

In 1867 Father William Kennedy became the first fulltime parish priest and undertook the construction of the Gothic style stone church,

designed by Messrs Wright and Hamilton.

Tenders for the building of the church were called and Mr. Samuel Rossiter, of Moonta won the contract from three others. The tender was £578 and 15 shillings.

Advertisements were placed in the local paper, notifying that the church would be opened, Sunday 12th December by Fr John Smyth, Diocesan Vicar General.

The Bishop of Adelaide, the Most Rev. Lawrence Bonaventure Sheil, laid a Foundation Stone and Governor Sir James Fergusson was present as were Fr. William Kennedy and Fr. James Maher.
